

To Consider

Gaze a moment at the diagrams below, saying softly to yourself, "These are all exactly the same." Close your eyes and recall that every collar in this entire chapter is either a combination or a camp, and then imagine that the jacket chapter is full of shawls (it is). Finally, open up your eyes again and look at the last figure, in pink, saying, "That's a facing-collar combo that could become an inset front panel." Before long, you'll hear a soft bell tinkling.



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
